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



Four monks celebrate priesthood jubilees

The Benedictine monks at Saint Meinrad Archabbey will celebrate the priesthood ordination jubilees of four of their confreres on May 27, 2018. Honored will be Fr. Bonaventure Knaebel, 75 years; Fr. Columba Kelly, 60 years; Fr. Noël Mueller, 50 years; and Fr. Denis Robinson, 25 years.

Fr. Bonaventure was born in New Albany, IN, on September 6, 1918. He professed his monastic vows on August 6, 1938, and was ordained to the priesthood on June 5, 1943. This year also marks the 80th anniversary of his monastic profession and his 100th birthday.

He attended minor and major seminary at Saint Meinrad, and then earned a Master of Science degree in 1946 from The Catholic University of America. He served as archabbot of the Saint Meinrad community from 1955 to 1966. He was the first Hoosier native to lead the monastery and, at 36, one of the youngest Benedictine abbots.

Other assignments have included teaching in Saint Meinrad's high school and college, assistant spiritual director at Saint Meinrad School of Theology, assistant manager at Abbey Press, and eight years as a missionary at Saint Meinrad's mission in Huaraz, Peru.

Fr. Bonaventure has served as pastor at Sacred Heart Parish, Jeffersonville, IN, and St. Michael Parish, Charlestown, IN. He has been administrator of the Benedictine monastery in Morelia, Mexico; Corpus Christi Abbey in Sandia, TX; and St. Michael Parish in Bradford, IN. He also served as a chaplain at St. Paul Hermitage, Beech Grove, IN.

Fr. Columba is a native of Williamsburg, IA. He professed vows on July 31, 1953, and was ordained to the priesthood July 5, 1958. He graduated from Saint Meinrad College and then earned a licentiate in sacred theology from Sant' Anselmo in 1959. He studied at the Pontifical Institute of Sacred Music in Rome, earning a doctorate in 1963.

Fr. Columba was the monastery choirmaster for many years, beginning in 1964. During that time, he began composing English-language chants based on the principles used to create the original Gregorian chant repertory. That same year, he began teaching in the Saint Meinrad schools. Fr. Columba served as prior (second in leadership) of the monastery from 1978-84. He taught summer sessions in the St. Joseph College Liturgical Music Program in Rensselear, IN, from 1964-72. He has led numerous workshops on chant throughout the United States, at the Abbey of Solesmes in France and for Benedictine communities in Australia. In 2015 he was named only the second recipient of the Spiritus Liturgiae Award, given by the Liturgical Institute.

In addition to composing, he gives workshops and publishes extensively in scholarly journals. He also has written two books on chant. He is an adjunct faculty member at Saint Meinrad Seminary and School of Theology.

Fr. Noël is a native of Louisville, KY, and he professed his monastic vows on August 15, 1963. He was ordained a priest on September 22, 1968.

From 1969 to 1980, he served at Saint Meinrad's mission in Huaraz, Peru, teaching English and religion and serving as coordinator of both the Office of Liturgy and Marriage Encounter in the Diocese of Huaraz, as well as other duties.

He earned a master's degree in English literature from the University of Louisville in 1985 and taught for 13 years at Saint Meinrad College. He also has served as monastery guest master, as associate director of continuing education and associate dean for housing and food services for the School of Theology, and as the secretary to the archabbot.

Currently, he serves as a formation dean in the seminary and as a spiritual director and retreat director.

Fr. Denis is a native of Iuka, MS. He attended Saint Meinrad College and School of Theology, earning a bachelor's degree in philosophy in 1989 and a Master of Divinity in 1993. From 1993-97, he was parochial vicar for the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Memphis, TN.

Monk professes first vows

Novice Joseph Wagner professed his temporary vows as a Benedictine monk in a ceremony on January 20, 2018, at Saint Meinrad Archabbey.

He has completed his novitiate, a year of prayer and study of the Benedictine way of life. As is the custom during the profession of vows, he chose a religious name. Novice Joseph is now Br. Stanley.

He is most likely the first religious to take Blessed Fr. Stanley Rother as his patron. Fr. Rother was an Oklahoma City priest who was martyred in 1981 in Guatemala. On December 2, 2016, Pope Francis officially recognized Fr. Rother as a martyr for the faith. He is the first American-born martyr and the first U.S. priest to be beatified. Cardinal Angelo Amato celebrated the Rite of Beatification on September 23, 2017, in Oklahoma City. Br. Stanley, 30, of Quincy, IL, attended high school at Archbishop Quigley Preparatory Seminary in Chicago. He earned a bachelor's degree in history from Quincy University and a master's degree in liturgical studies from University of St. Mary of the Lake. He was a member of St. Aloysius Parish in Springfield, IL.

Before joining the monastery, he was a high school teacher at St. Anthony High School in Effingham, IL, and an archivist for the Illinois Secretary of State.


Temporary vows are typically for three years. This period offers a continuing opportunity for the monk and the monastic community to determine whether monastic life is, indeed, the right vocation for this individual.

Archbishop Emeritus Daniel M. Buechlein, OSB, dies January 25

Archbishop Daniel M. Buechlein, OSB, 79, monk and priest of Saint Meinrad Archabbey and archbishop emeritus of the Archdiocese of Indianapolis, died at 12:20 a.m. on January 25, 2018, in the monastery infirmary.

He is survived by his brother, Charles, of Jasper, IN; and nieces and nephews.

He was born in Jasper, IN, on April 20, 1938, to Carl and Rose (Blessinger) Buechlein and given the name Marcus George.

He joined the monastery on August 14, 1958, and professed his simple vows on August 15, 1959, taking the name Daniel. He made his solemn vows on August 15, 1962. He was ordained to the priesthood by the Most Rev. Paul Schulte on May 3, 1964, and celebrated his first Mass on May 24 at Holy Family Parish, Jasper.

After his ordination, Fr. Daniel spent two years in Rome, where he obtained a licentiate in sacred theology with a specialization in liturgy at the International Benedictine University of Sant' Anselmo.

Returning to Saint Meinrad in 1966, he served as assistant dean of students and

chairman of the Division of Religion at Saint Meinrad College. In 1971 he was director of the first national conference for seminary spiritual directors, and coordinated the founding of the Midwest Association of Seminary Spiritual Directors.

That same year, he began 16 years of service as president-rector of Saint Meinrad School of Theology, the last five of which he also served as president-rector of the college. In addition to serving many elected terms on the Archabbot's Council during this time, he taught courses on priestly ministry and spirituality.

On January 20, 1987, Pope St. John Paul II announced the appointment of Fr. Daniel as the third bishop of the Diocese of Memphis, TN. His ordination and installation took place on March 2, 1987.

On July 13, 1992, Pope St. John Paul announced that Bishop Daniel would succeed the Most Rev. Edward T. O'Meara, who had died that January, as the 11th bishop and fifth archbishop of Indianapolis. On September 9, he was installed as archbishop in the Cathedral of Saints Peter and Paul. He was invested with the pallium by the Holy Father at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome on June 29, 1993.

During his 19 years as shepherd of Indianapolis, Archbishop Daniel worked to strengthen the archdiocese's pastoral, spiritual and financial health. He was especially interested in promoting Catholic education, young adult ministry, and vocations to priesthood and the religious life.

Under his leadership, enrollment in the archdiocese's Catholic schools increased 30 percent to more than 25,000 students, reversing a 25-year decline. Innovative partnerships with Lilly Endowment Inc., campaigns to help fund new education initiatives, and the support of the business community led to improved student performance, which the U.S. Department of Education recognized by awarding 26 archdiocesan schools with Blue Ribbon awards for excellence.

Archbishop Daniel garnered support to keep Catholic schools in the Indianapolis center-city open to serve students from low-income families and the growing immigrant population. He also led the effort to build two new grade schools in the center-city. Archbishop Daniel expanded the archdiocese's ministry to young adults by starting a Theology on Tap program, adding new college campus ministry programs, and creating new archdiocesan staff positions to provide outreach to young adults.

In 2003, Archbishop Daniel established the ministry of permanent diaconate in the archdiocese. The first class of 25 deacons was ordained in 2008, and the ministry continues to flourish.

Archbishop Daniel founded the Bishop Simon Bruté College Seminary in Indianapolis in 2004, to prepare college seminarians for major seminary. The seminary quickly attracted young men discerning a vocation to the priesthood and today has nearly 50 seminarians from 10 dioceses.

Archbishop Daniel also expanded the services of Catholic Charities and social outreach ministries of the archdiocese. The archdiocese in 2009 opened a 30,000square-foot shelter for homeless families, the Holy Family Shelter, located on the west side of Indianapolis.

The financial health of the archdiocese also improved under Archbishop Daniel's management. During his tenure, the archdiocese raised \$300 million through the annual stewardship appeal and separate capital campaigns to pay for building projects and ministry needs throughout the archdiocese.

After a series of significant budget deficits, Archbishop Daniel guided the archdiocese back to firm financial footing and break-even budgets. He also oversaw the dramatic growth of the Catholic

He joined the monastery at Saint Meinrad in August 1996 and made his solemn profession on August 15, 2000. Fr. Denis also attended the Catholic University of Louvain, Belgium, where he received a master's degree in theology in 2002, a licentiate in sacred theology in 2003, and doctorates in sacred theology and philosophy in 2007.

Since 2008, Fr. Denis has served as president-rector of Saint Meinrad Seminary and School of Theology. He is also associate professor of systematic theology. Other assignments have included director of continuing education, director of the permanent deacon formation program and subprior (third in leadership) of the monastery.

Community Foundation, which oversees the archdiocese's endowments. During his tenure, 337 endowment funds with a value of more than \$100 million were established.

He suffered a mild stroke on March 18, 2011, and was admitted to St. Vincent Hospital in Indianapolis. On August 1 he sent a letter to the Holy Father asking, for reasons of health, to resign from his responsibilities as archbishop and to return to Saint Meinrad. Pope Benedict XVI granted his request, and the Archbishop took up residence in the monastery infirmary in October.

He continued his office of teaching as his health permitted, publishing in 2013 the book, *Surprised by Grace: Memories and Reflections After 25 Years of Episcopal Ministry*.

The funeral Mass was held on January 31 at Saints Peter and Paul Cathedral, Indianapolis. Burial was in the Archabbey Cemetery on February 1. +

Abbey Caskets opens new workshop

Abbey Caskets has opened a new production facility on the campus of Saint Meinrad Archabbey in St. Meinrad, IN.

The new workshop, which builds wooden caskets and cremation urns, is open for public tours.

Abbey Caskets was established in 1999 to sell wooden caskets and cremation urns directly to the public. The simple caskets include a design based on the casket used to bury the Benedictine monks.

Last fall, a building previously used by Abbey Press was emptied, cleaned and painted. A sprinkler system and sanding and finishing booths were installed and a dust wall was built to separate the finishing station from the cutting and sanding stations.

In addition, Abbey Caskets hired two people for the casket production and another for customer service. Saint Meinrad monk Fr. Dominic Warnecke, OSB, also is working several days a week. The workshop began production earlier this year. Having the casket workshop on site gives Abbey Caskets more control over the quality of the products and helps keep costs down, according to Jenny Keller, director of Abbey Caskets. In addition, customers who want to see how the caskets are made can do so.

16 parishes chosen to participate in the Young Adult Initiative

Sixteen parishes have been chosen to participate in the Young Adult Initiative of Saint Meinrad Seminary and School of Theology.

The program is funded by a \$1.38 million grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. to improve parish outreach to young adults and better engage them with the Catholic Church. Parishes were invited to apply for the program, and Saint Meinrad received 96 applications. The parishes represent five states and 13 dioceses. Parishes range in size from 259 households to 2,578 households. Twelve of the parishes operate elementary schools.

"We went through a lengthy but thorough selection process and prayerful discernment to find a wide variety of parish settings and situations," said Michal Horace, director of the Young Adult Initiative. "The partner parishes

> include small, mid-size and large parishes, as well as rural, urban and suburban parishes. Many of the partner parishes have multicultural congregations." In partnership with Saint

Holy Spirit Parish, Bowling Green, KY; Immaculate Conception Parish, La Grange, KY; Mary Queen of the Holy Rosary Parish, Lexington, KY; Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish, Jeffersonville, IN;

Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish, New Albany, IN; St. Alphonsus Liguori Parish, Zionsville, IN; St. Augustine Parish, Lebanon, KY; St. Bartholomew Parish, Columbus, IN; St. Cecilia Parish, Cincinnati, OH;

St. Clare of Assisi Parish, O'Fallon, IL; St. John the Evangelist Parish, St. John, IN; and St. Monica Parish, Mishawaka, IN.

Meinrad Seminary and School of Theology, parishes will explore the demographics of their communities, learn more about today's young adults (ages 23-29), and develop innovative strategies to better meet the spiritual needs of the young adults in their parish. "Improving our ministry to young adults is crucial for today's Catholic Church," according to Horace. "How can we build relationships with young adults and strengthen the domestic Church in young adult households? How can each parish examine its structures and processes in order to be more welcoming to young adults? This initiative will focus on innovation in how our Church engages with young adults and meets their spiritual needs." ^L



Q. *When did you begin your studies?* Summer of 2017.

Saint Meinrad Archabbey was recognized as the Indiana Tree Farmer of the Year for 2017 at the annual meeting of the Indiana Hardwood Lumbermen's Association on February 7 in Indianapolis.

Michael Gregg, Saint Meinrad's consulting forester, and Fr. Guy Mansini, OSB, were on hand to receive the award on behalf of the Archabbey.

The Archabbey's interest in good stewardship dates back to 1923, when it enrolled in Indiana's Classified Forest Program, established under the leadership of the distinguished conservationist, Charles Deam. Since then, the Archabbey woods have provided timber for its own building projects and, since 1965, have helped sustain the local timber and woodworking industry with over four million board feet of lumber.

In 2006 and 2007, the Archabbey reforested substantial acreage of old pasture and crop land with the help of the American Electric Power Co. and the Wetlands Reserve Program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

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Archbishop Peter Wells: DAA nominee serves Church in Africa

Archbishop Wells currently serves as papal nuncio to South Africa, Botswana, Lesotho, Namibia and Swaziland. Pope Francis announced the appointment on February 9, 2016, at the same time elevating Wells to the rank of archbishop.

A nuncio is the pope's ambassador to a country. In an interview shortly after he arrived in South Africa, Archbishop Wells described it this way: "My role is to take the hopes, the concerns, the aspirations and the sufferings of the local Church back to the pope and then to bring back to the local Church what the Holy Father has in mind for them: his hopes, his aspirations, his comfort and solidarity."

A native of Tulsa, OK, Archbishop Wells earned a bachelor's degree at Saint Meinrad College in 1987 and then continued his priesthood studies at the Pontifical North American College at Rome. He was ordained in 1991 for the Diocese of Tulsa.

In the diocese, he served as assistant pastor at Holy Family Cathedral in Tulsa, secretary to the bishop, and vicar for religious education.

He began his diplomatic work with the Holy See on July 1, 1999, after obtaining a licentiate and doctoral degree in canon law from the Pontifical Gregorian University, in 1998 and 1999, respectively. He also earned a baccalaureate in theology in 1990. His first diplomatic assignment was to the nunciature in Nigeria.

Wells served in Nigeria during a difficult time in that country's history, according to an alumnus who nominated him for the award. As part of his work, Wells successfully oversaw the building of the new nunciature there.

In 2002, Wells was called back to Rome to work at the Section for General Affairs of the Secretariat of State. He was appointed to head the English desk in 2006. In addition to English, he is fluent in Italian, French, Spanish and German.

In 2013, Pope Francis named Wells secretary of the five-member Pontifical

Commission responsible for investigating the Institute for Works of Religion. He also served as president of the Holy See's Financial Security Committee.

One nominator, a Saint Meinrad classmate, recalls Wells from their days as college students. "Peter is a man of great character whose sense of humor, wit and devotion are representative of the qualities which I associate with a good priest.

"Saint Meinrad surely nurtured these qualities in Peter during his studies and, undoubtedly, the student community received the benefit of his joyfulness, genuine piety and exceptional ability to lead others."

"The Church is a much richer institution having Peter Wells at Her service," noted another of his nominators. "He is a devoted priest and an outstanding candidate for Saint Meinrad's Distinguished Alumnus Award."

Another alumnus who nominated Wells for the award called him "a bright mind with a tremendous sense of humor. He has worked hard out of love for the Church and has certainly made Saint Meinrad proud in his service."

Wells C'87 will become the 27th Saint Meinrad alumnus to receive the Distinguished Alumnus Award when it is conferred on July 24 during the annual Alumni Reunion.
